## Dear Governor Healey:

We, the undersigned, write with deep concern over the significant climate impacts that would result from implementing the private jet infrastructure expansion plan at Hanscom Field Civil Airport in Concord, Lexington, Bedford, and Lincoln Massachusetts. This development plan, proposed by Runway Realty Ventures LLC, also stands to pose irreparable harm to one of the most historically and ecologically significant areas in our country. We understand this 522,000 sq. ft. luxury private jet hangar project is one of the largest to be proposed in the United States.

As you are aware, private luxury jet travel is the most deleterious form of travel relative to the carbon footprint emitted per passenger. Infrastructure expansion plans to facilitate and further encourage the growth of private luxury jet travel, serving an extremely small population, is unnecessary and unwise given the dire need for immediate and drastic reductions in greenhouse gas emissions. A private jet can emit 7,500 tons of CO2e per year, while an average global citizen emits 4.7 tons of CO2e per year. Against the backdrop of rapid climate change that requires significant societal lifestyle modifications, *needless* expansion of private luxury jet infrastructure, to benefit the very few, should be discouraged and curtailed.

According to NASA's Goddard Institute of Space Studies, the summer of 2024 was the hottest on record. Unprecedented deadly heatwaves, floods, storms and wildfires have ensued globally; landscape and population ecology along with biodiversity already reflect tragic and irreversible impacts. The IPCC AR6 Climate Change 2023 Report warns: "There is a rapidly closing window of opportunity to secure a livable and sustainable future for all... The choices and actions implemented in this decade will have impacts now and for thousands of years." The report goes on to state, "Effective climate action is enabled by political commitment."

Ironically, the site for this half-million square foot, environmentally irresponsible private jet expansion plan lies in close proximity to Henry David Thoreau's Walden Pond and Walden Woods, revered worldwide as the birthplace of the Environmental Movement and for Thoreau's prominent role in furthering the ideals of equality, social reform, and protecting our finite and vulnerable natural resources.

Bordering the Hanscom Airport is Minute Man National Historical Park that occupies a unique and sacred place in the birth of the nation, a 250-year history that Americans will celebrate in both 2025 and 2026. Minute Man National Park, Walden and their historic environs represent and reflect our nation's ability to prevail, evolve, and enlighten in the face of extreme challenge. Today, climate change poses the planet's most formidable and complex challenge, one that demands of us immediate and unequivocal action.

Sixty percent of all the private jets in the world are based in the United States. We recognize that certain circumstances require the use of private jet transportation. That said, our focus, at this time of a rapidly warming climate, is to reduce, not expand, infrastructure build-out that would encourage and incentivize unnecessary growth of private jet travel – especially when such build out would negatively impact one of our nation's most historic regions. At the same time that most of us consume energy generated from fossil fuels, we rightly advocate for the vigorous development of and aggressive conversion to low-carbon energy.

By halting this private jet infrastructure development plan at Hanscom Field Airport, you will inspire and encourage other elected officials and decision-makers to remain committed to act on effective climate actions -- actions the IPCC has stated are *essential* in order to preserve a livable planet for current and future generations.

In 1630, John Winthrop, then to be future governor of the Massachusetts Bay Colony wrote: "The eyes of all people are upon us." Under your steadfast leadership, with the eyes of the world upon us, Massachusetts can meet the current challenges and set the example for wise, ethical, and sustainable transportation planning so critical to reaching our net zero climate goals by 2050.
